The U.S. Chamber of Commerce applauds your leadership in sponsoring S. 609, the "NEW START Act of 2023," which is designed to remove barriers to self-employment for formerly incarcerated Americans.

The Chamber launched our Equality of Opportunity Initiative (EOI) three years ago to develop solutions that help close race-based opportunity gaps. Prior convictions make reentry into society and the economy disproportionately challenging for Black Americans, and that is why one priority of EOI is focused on employment opportunities for formerly incarcerated individuals. The Chamber also believes we should make it easier for formerly incarcerated men and women to benefit from business ownership.
