

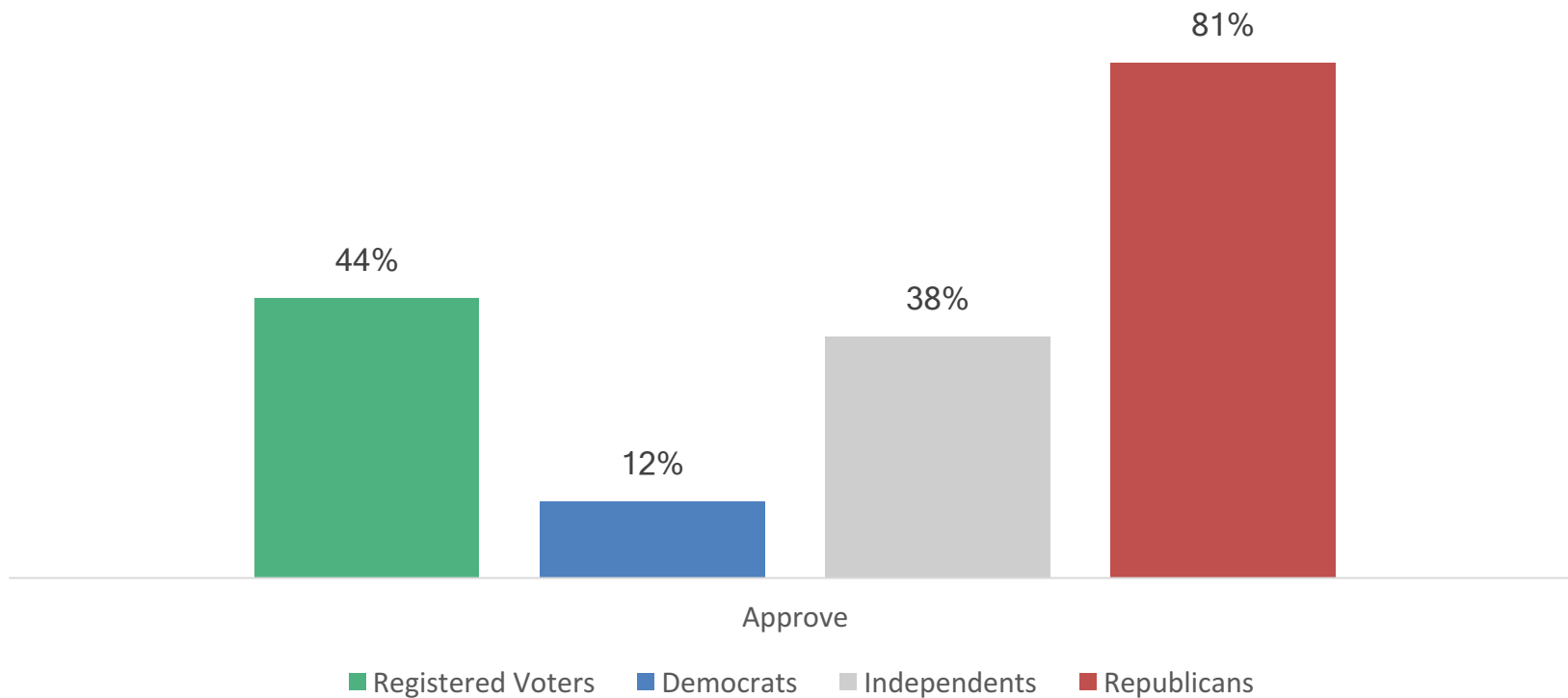

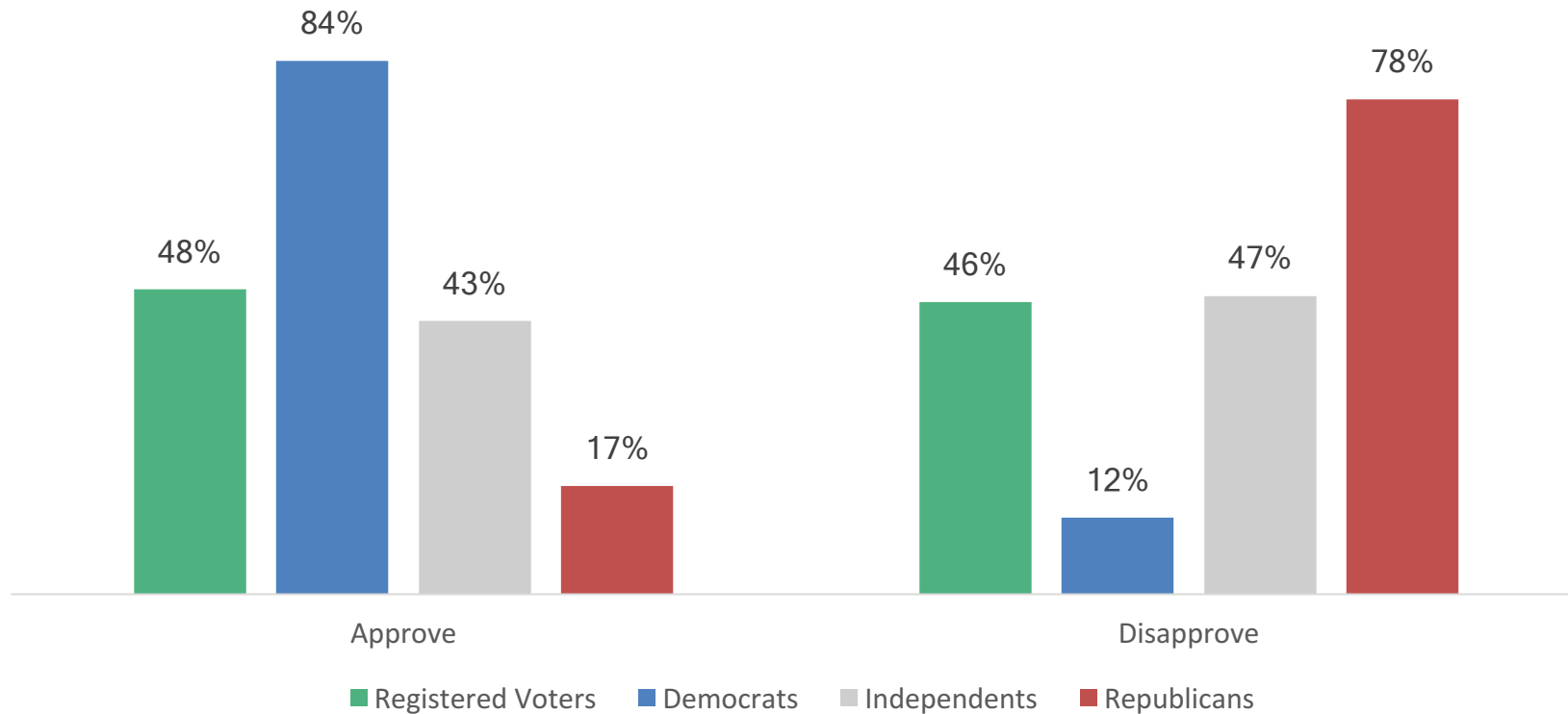
# Among Republicans, 81% approve of the job Trump is doing as President, compared to 12% among Democrats

*Do you approve or disapprove of the job Donald Trump is doing as President?*



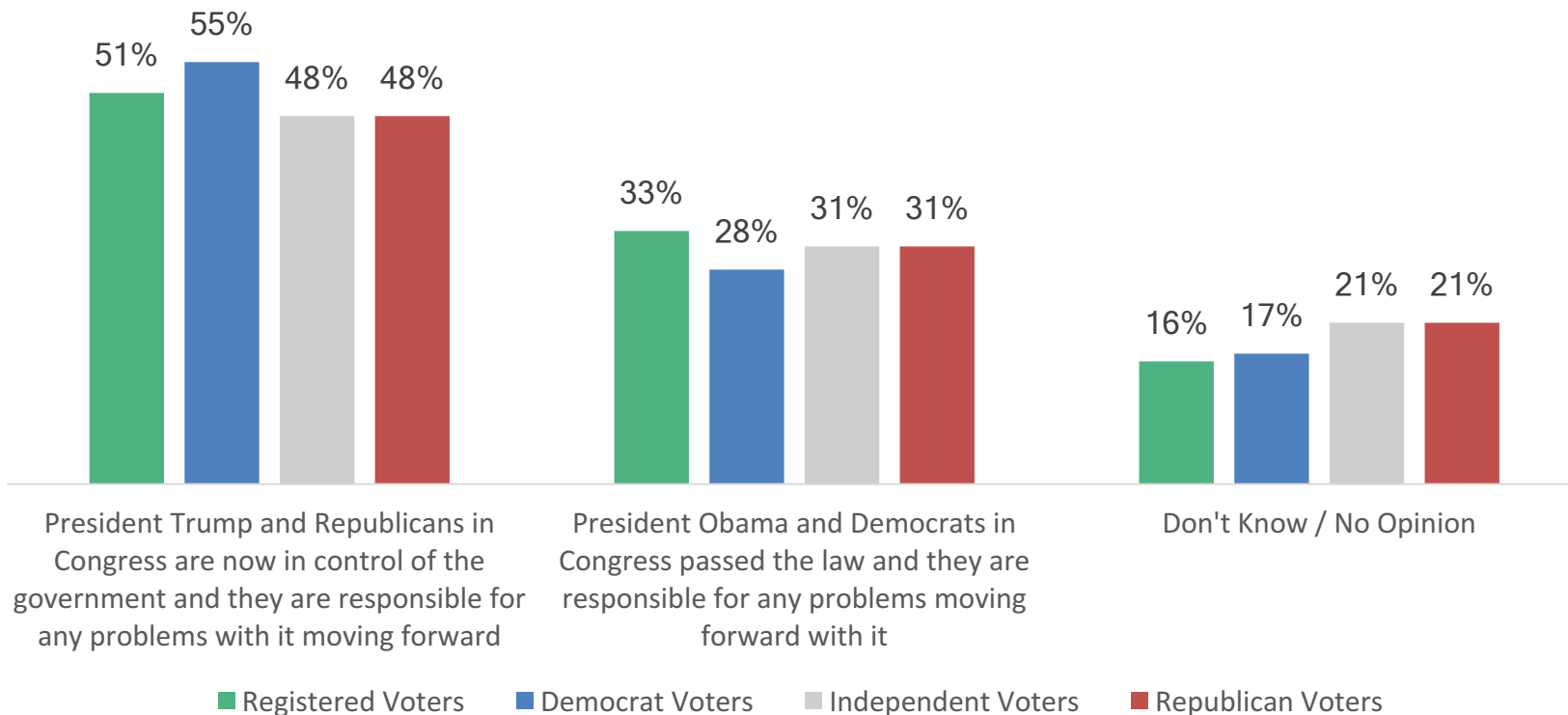
# 78% of Republicans disapprove of Obamacare

*Do you approve or disapprove of the health law known as the Affordable care Act, also known as Obamacare?*



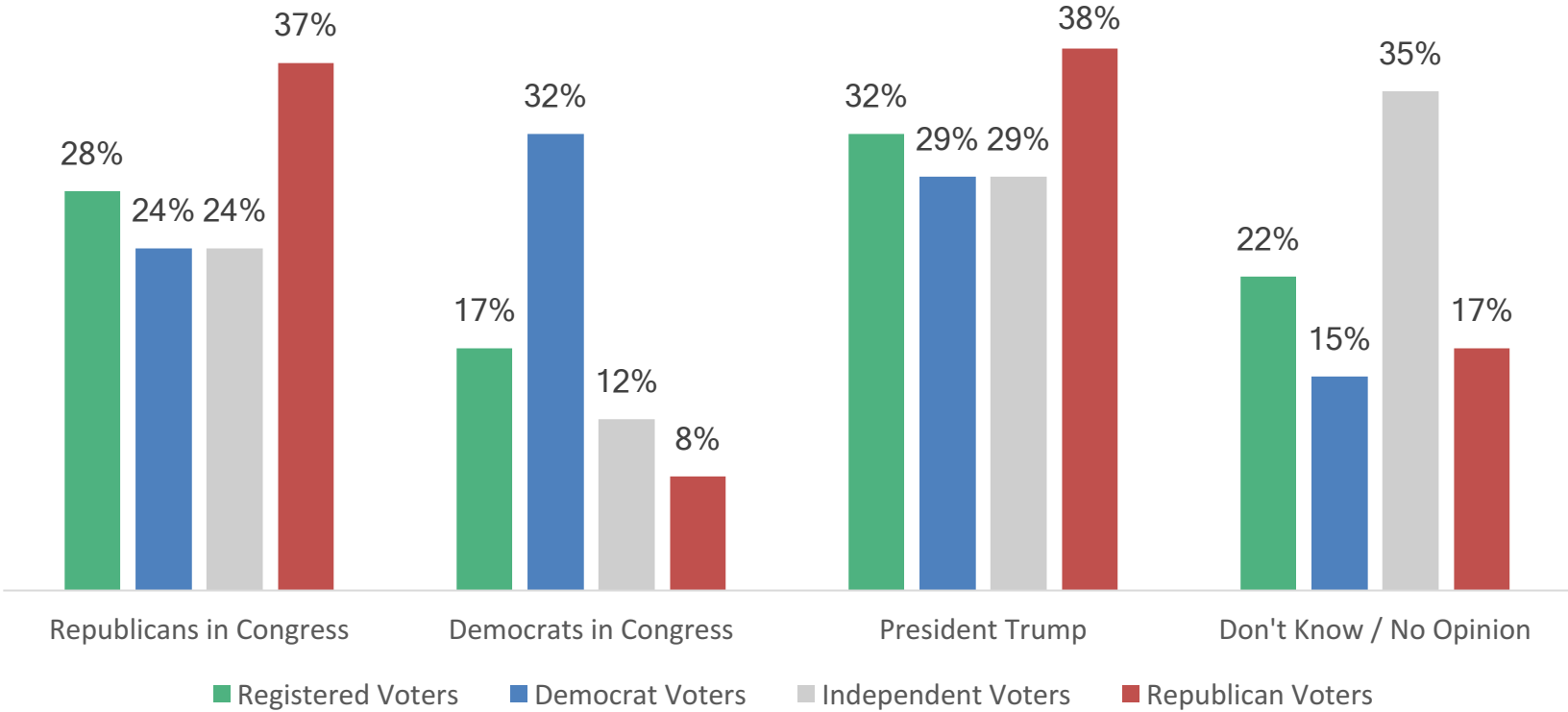
# Most voters think President Trump and Republicans in Congress are in control of the government and responsible for health care law moving forward

*As you may know, the health law known as the Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare, remains the law of the land. Which comes closer to your view?*



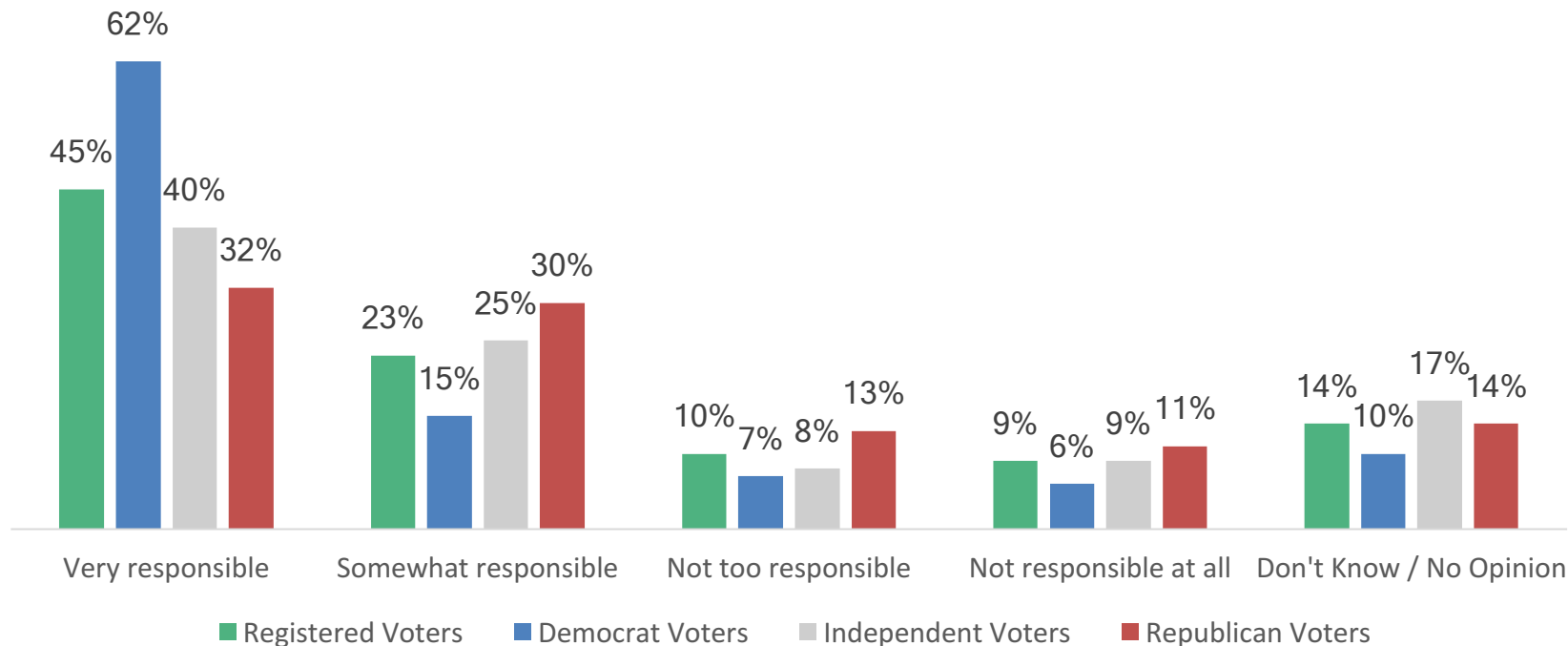
# 75% of Republicans think Republicans in Congress and President Trump are most responsible for making health care more affordable in the U.S.

Who is most responsible for making health care more affordable in the United States?



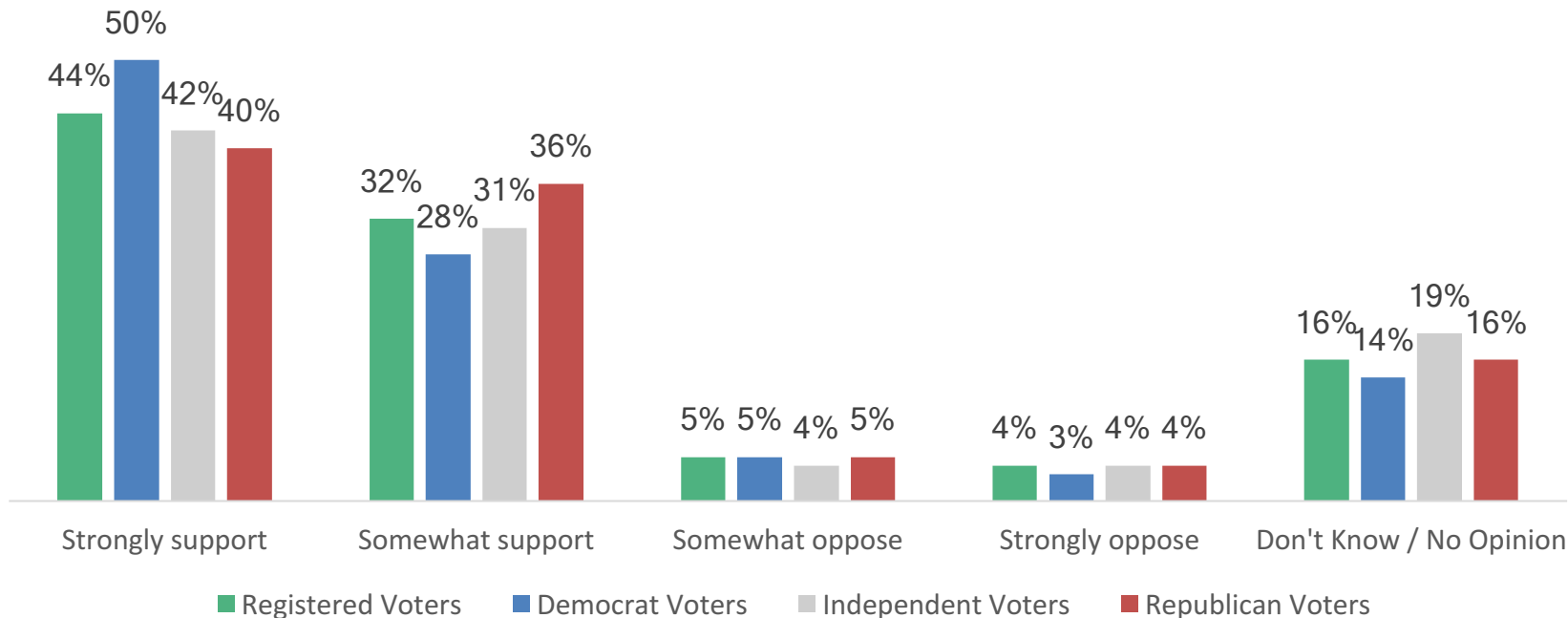
# Large majorities across parties think Trump and Congress are responsible for continued Funding of ACA while other reforms are explored

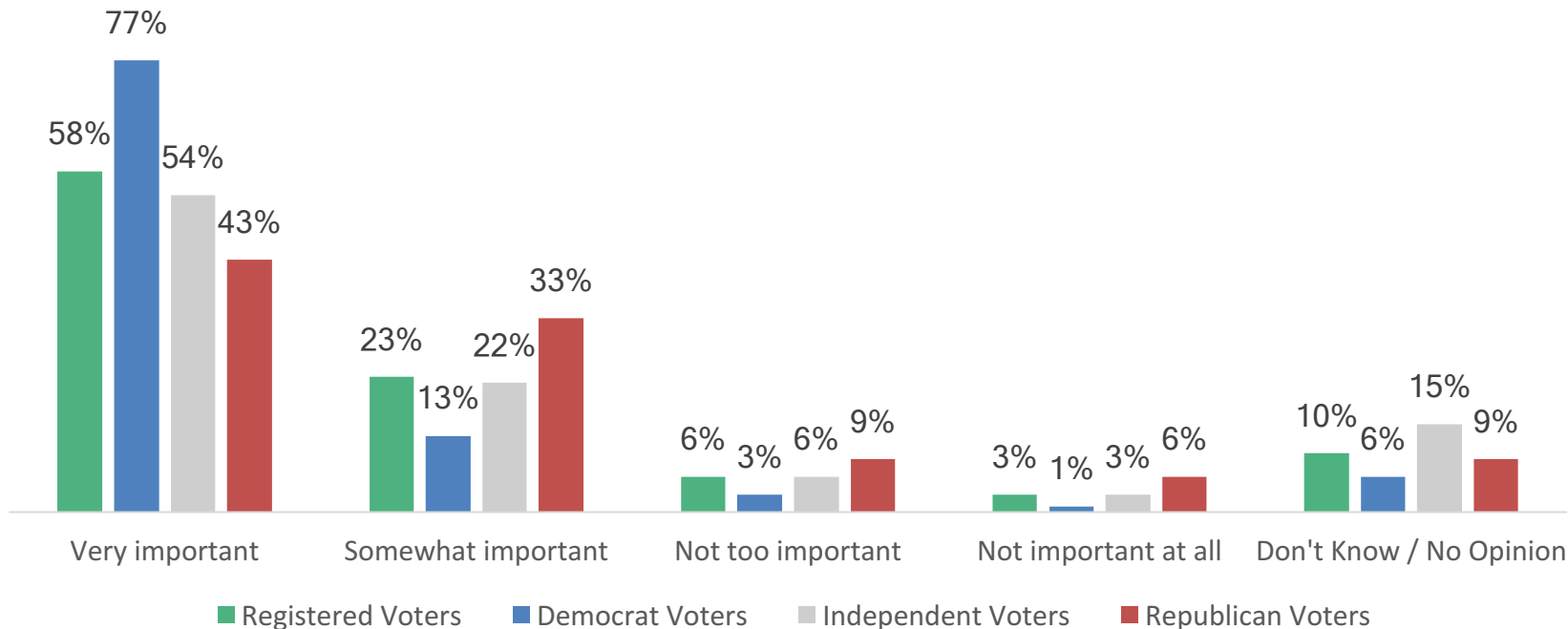
# 76% of voters support bipartisan legislation to help make insurance markets more certain and stable, to ensure they have coverage choices and to keep premiums in check

# 76% of Republicans think cost sharing reductions are important to help lower income Americans access medical care

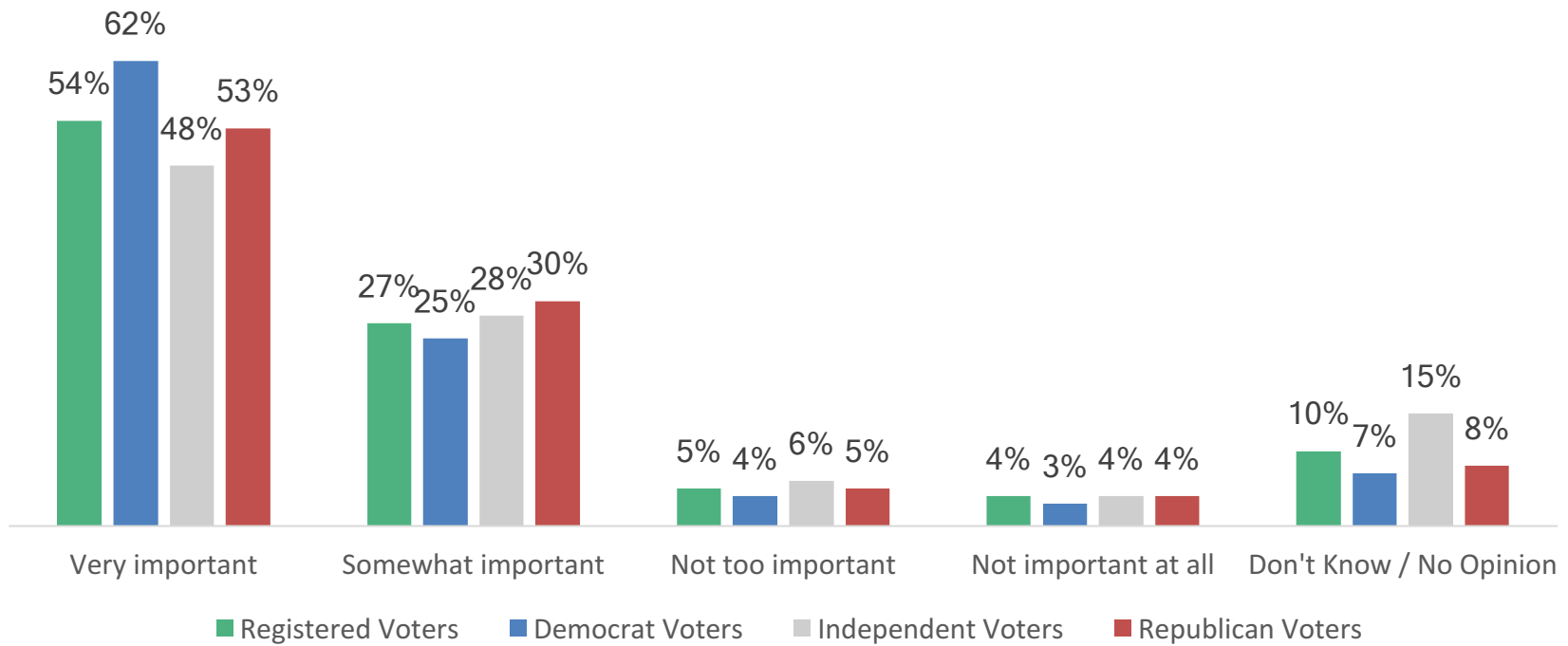

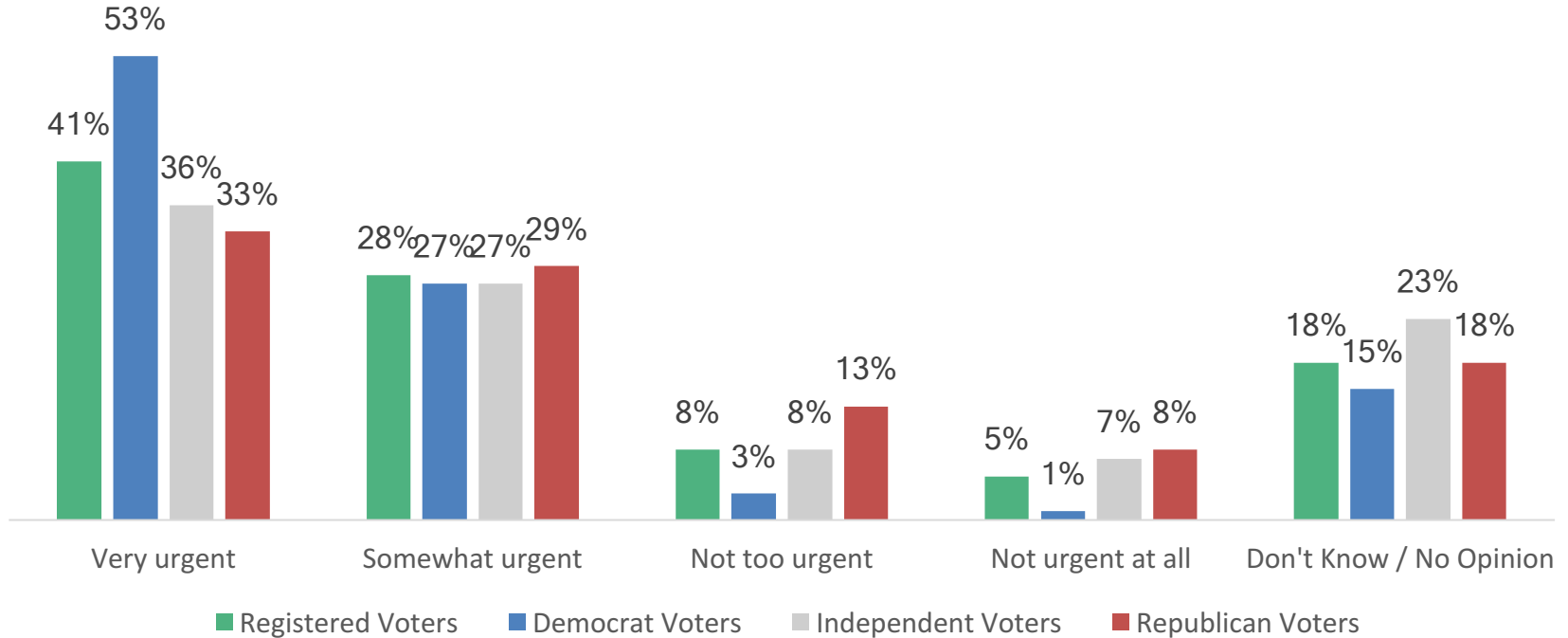
# 83% of Republicans think cost sharing reductions are important to allowing insurance companies to offer a variety of plans to those with different needs

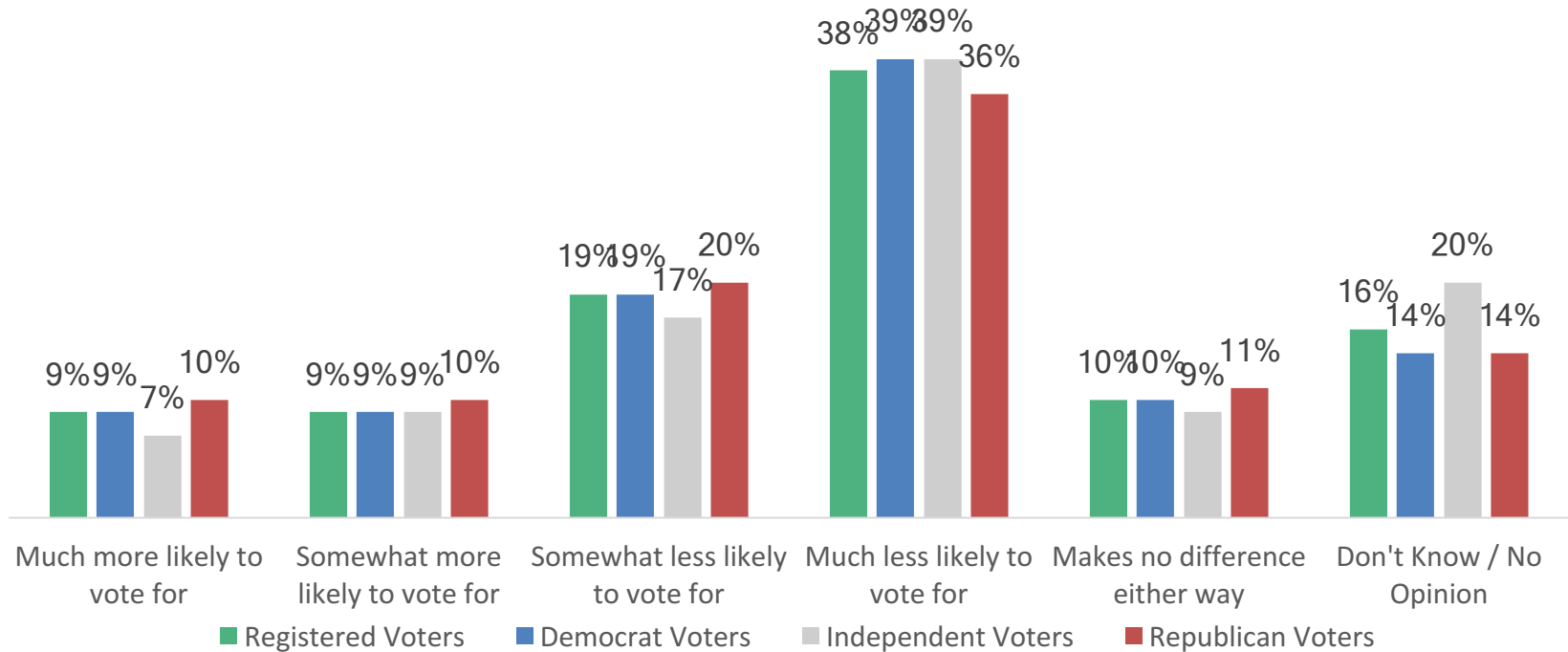
# 62% of Republicans agree it is urgent for Congress to fund cost sharing reductions in September to avoid potential 20% premium increases

*Insurance companies have warned that if action is not taken by Congress to fund cost-sharing reductions in September, many Americans health insurance premiums will increase, potentially by as much as 20% in the individual market, due to the uncertainty created in the health insurance marketplace. 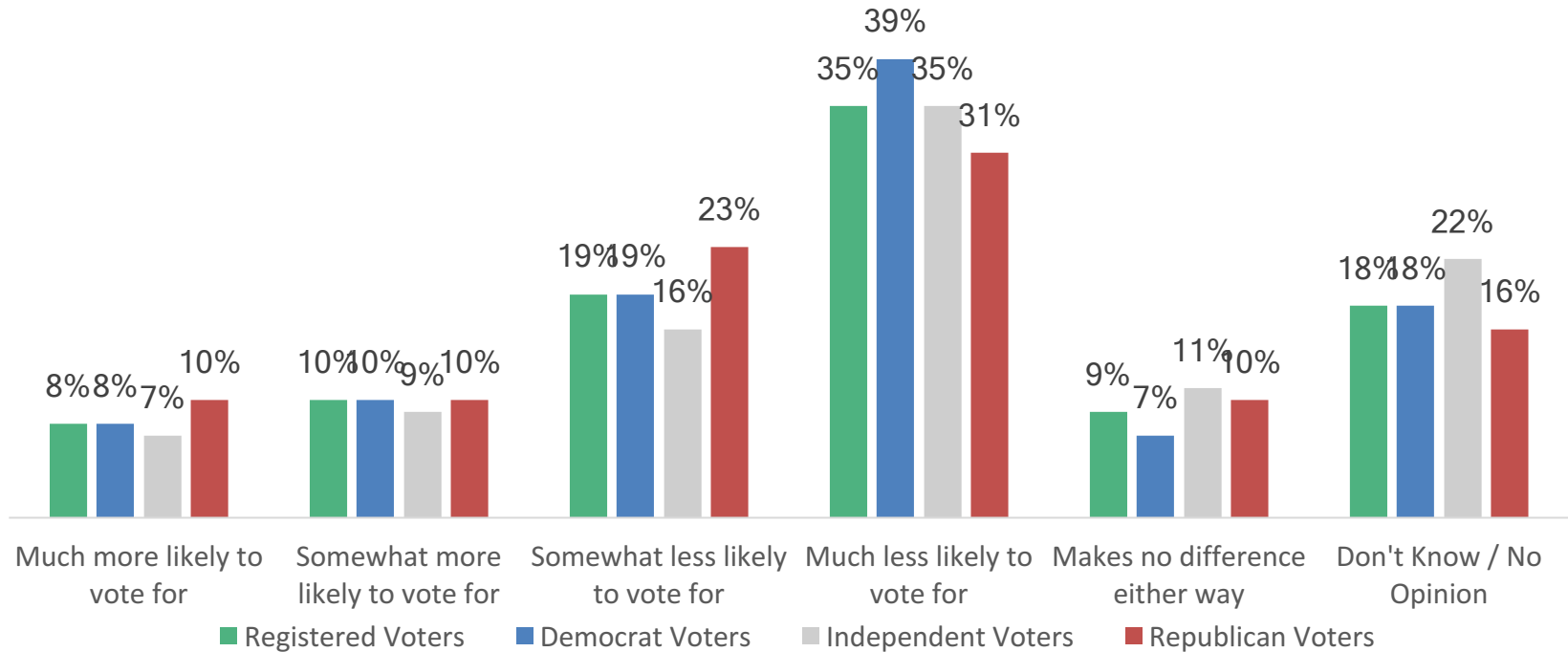
# 56% of Republicans would be less likely to vote for their member of Congress if they did not take steps to address problems with the ACA

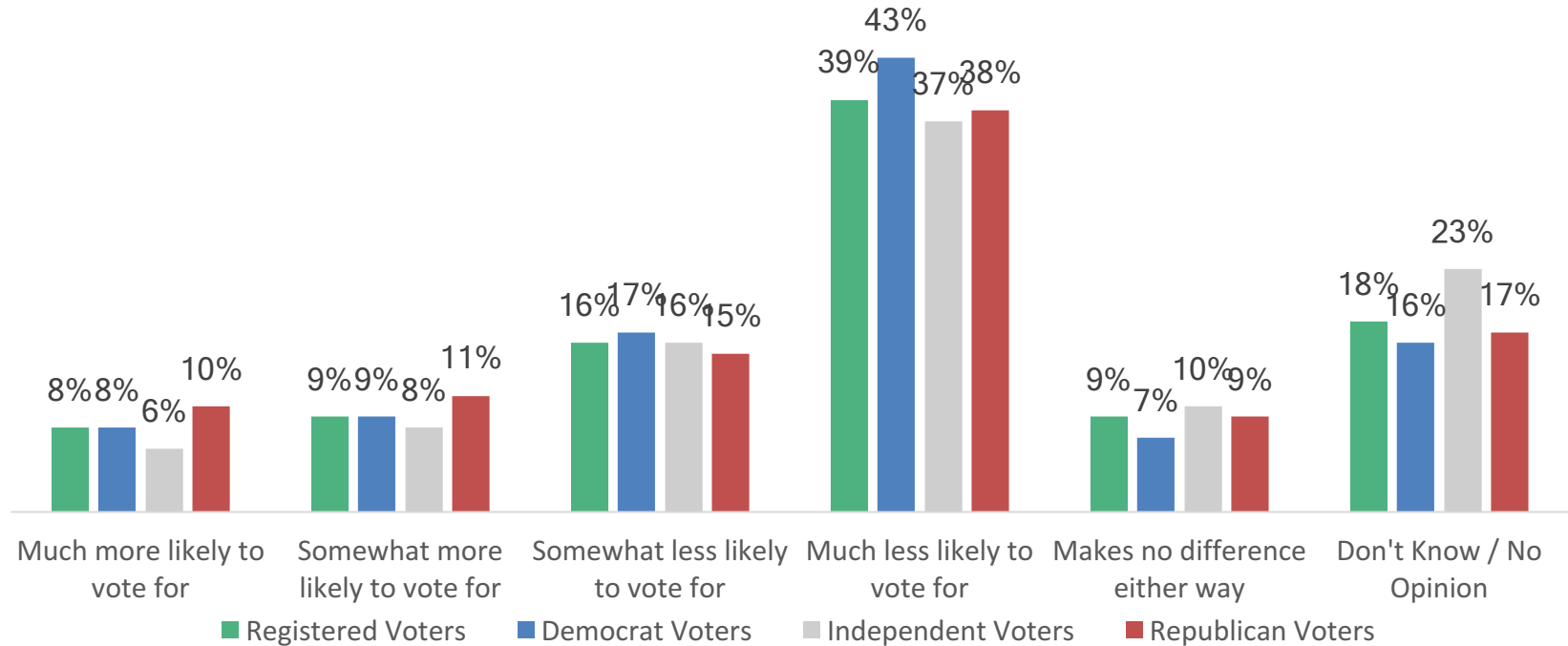
# 54% of Republicans would be less likely to vote for their member of Congress if they did not take steps to address problems with the ACA and the law “implodes”

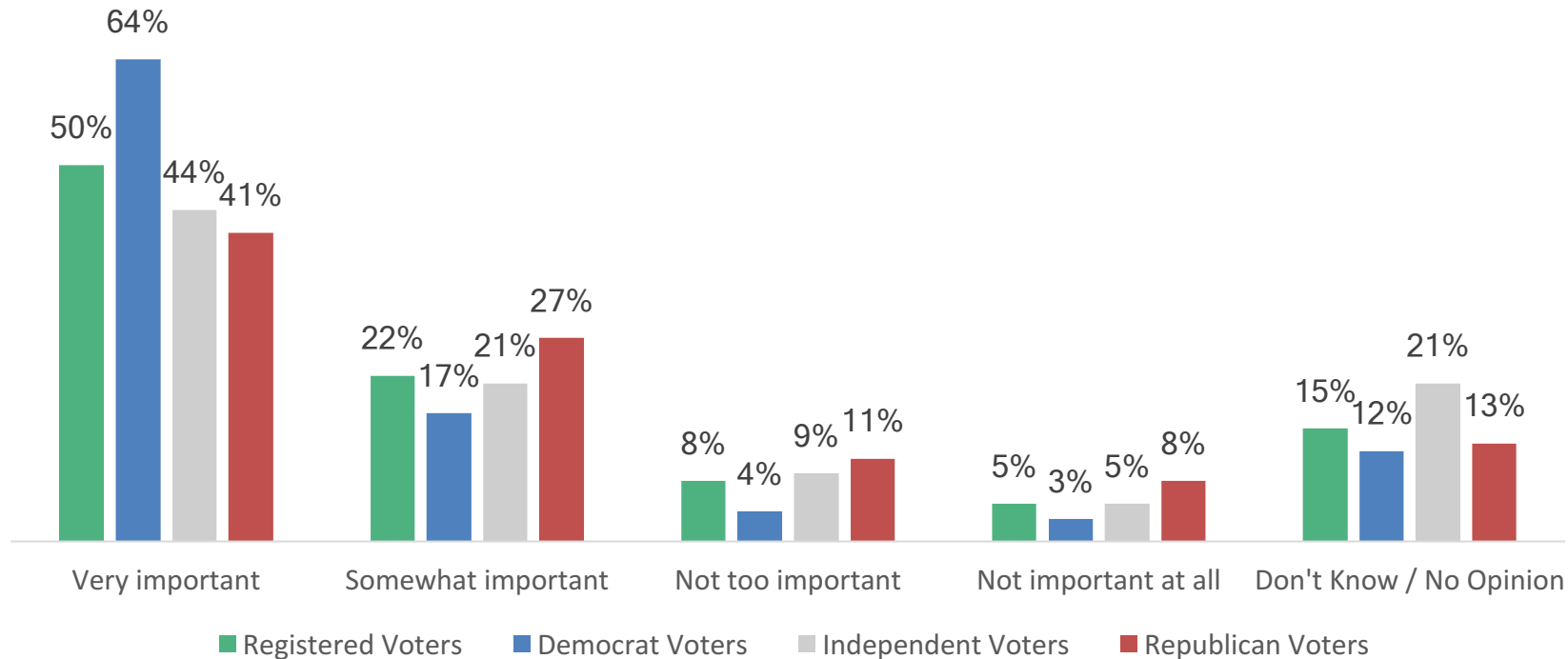
# 53% of Republicans would be less likely to vote for their member of Congress if they voted against legislation that improves health care
